In 1977 she was a joint winner of the Patricia Hackett Prize, and in 1979 won the Dame Mary Gilmore Award for poetry. Her books include *Costumes*, *White Dog Sonnets*, *A Latin Primer* and *Surly Girls*, which won the Steele Rudd Award. Her latest book of poetry is *The Kindly Ones* (2005). Books edited include *Stravinsky's Lunch*, *Gilgamesh* and *The Poison Principle*, which have all won major prizes.

Pamela Hewitt is a freelance editor, writer and trainer. She has developed and presented editing courses and workshops for educational institutions, writers' centres, literary festivals, editors' societies and government agencies. Pamela established Emend Editing online training courses for editors and the online journal, *The Fine Print*. Pamela is a member of the IPEd national working group on education, training and mentoring and she was also part of the national working group on accreditation.

Ed Highley is a director of Clarus Design Pty Ltd, a small company that has been providing writing, editing and graphic design services for 20 years, and internet and other electronic publishing services for a shorter time.
